Narrated by Jason Momoa the documentary investigates organizations that are extracting metals from the deep seafloor. It sheds light on the vital relationship between the deep ocean and sustaining life on Earth. The documentary chronicles the Lakota people's struggle to reclaim the Black Hills, the Native American tribe's sacred land that was stolen by the U.S. government — that also violated a series of treaty agreements with them. Vikram Agrawal is the Co-Founder and CEO of American Resilience Partners and Director of EarthxCapital. Vikram has 15 years of investment and management experience across several industry sectors through his prior roles with Citigroup;

International Finance Corporation, a private sector arm of the World Bank Group focused on sustainable development; Patriarch Partners, a private investment firm dedicated to saving American jobs; and Prophet Equity. Vikram has worked with businesses in various life cycles, including concept, start-ups, growing businesses and businesses in need of a strategic or operational turnaround. He has experience developing investment theses; sourcing and structuring equity and debt investments; conducting strategic and financial analyses; and partnering with senior company management to develop and implement strategic, operational, and other transformational initiatives. Vikram received his M.B.A. from Yale School of Management and B.S. from Georgetown University.



Allison Archambault is President of EarthSpark, a nonprofit organization that works to build clean energy systems and businesses that empower communities in Haiti and around the world. Since 2008, EarthSpark has pioneered smart, solar

microgrids, piloted innovative electric cooking, and launched a microgrid development company with a local-nationalinternational blended finance approach now backed by the Green Climate Fund. Archambault has consulted to clean energy companies, governments, and advocacy groups. She previously worked with 3TIER on large-scale renewable energy siting and integration and with GridPoint, an early clean tech company combining distributed energy storage, solar PV, and energy management. Under Archambault's tutelage, EarthSpark has spun off smart meter company, SparkMeter and also helped spin-off a Haitian microgrid operator. Archambault holds a B.A. from Tufts University and a Master of International Public Policy from Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies.



Xiye Bastida became the leader of her New York City school's environmental club at the age of 16, when she mobilized 600 students in the first Global Climate Strike. Since then, she has taken a citywide leadership role in organizing Climate

Strikes and speaking out about Climate Justice issues in rallies. Bastida was born and raised in Mexico as part of the Otomi-Toltec indigenous peoples. Currently, she is one of the lead organizers of Fridays For Future and sits on the Administration Committee of Peoples Climate Movement. Recently, she launched a Youth Activism Training Program to expand the Climate Justice movement. Bastida is a member of Sunrise Movement, Extinction Rebellion and in 2018, she was invited to the ninth U.N. World Urban Forum to speak about Indigenous Cosmology. Notably, she received the "Spirit of the UN" award in 2018.



Sheelah Bearfoot (Chiricahua Apache) is a co-founder of Ties to La Tierra. While completing a degree in Genetics and Plant Biology at UC Berkeley, she was privileged to serve as a research apprentice on a food sovereignty project with the Klamath Tribes

and direct Speech at Berkeley. The speech team gave her a national platform for advocacy to educate hundreds of people on environmental and medical racism against Native communities. She worked at the Native American Health Center in San Francisco for two years as a diabetes-focused health educator before earning a Master of Health Science in Environmental Health at Johns Hopkins, where she continued her focus on Indigenous health disparities. She's especially interested in mitigating Indigenous exposure to endocrine disrupting chemicals, a passion she incorporates into her current environmental justice work.



William Becker is Executive Director of the Presidential Climate Action Project, an initiative that develops recommendations for the federal response to climate change. Becker is a journalist who began his career as a combat correspondent for the U.S. Army

during the Vietnam War. During the late 1970s, he proposed and helped accomplish the relocation of a rural town from a floodplain to higher ground, and its reconstruction as America's first passive-solar-heated community. Starting in 1995, under three presidents, he served for 17 years as a senior official at the U.S. Department of Energy, where he developed his expertise in clean energy and climate change mitigation. Becker has authored several books and countless articles on these topics.



Andrew Behar is CEO of As You Sow, the nation's leading non-profit practitioner of shareholder advocacy and engagement. With a 30-year track record of success, As You Sow advances values-aligned investing and uses shareholder power to compel

companies to reduce material risk on issues including climate change; toxins in the food system; ocean plastics; diversity, equity and inclusion; racial justice; and wage equity. Previously Andrew has worked as a documentary filmmaker and entrepreneur, founding start-ups that developed innovative physiological monitoring devices and grid-scale fuel cells. He is an inventor on five patents and was recently named as one of the Purposeful-50 "true changemakers who deliver on social justice, environmental protection, diversity, inclusion, racial equality and gender and pay equity." He is currently on the board of the Responsible Sourcing Network. He is author of the book, *The Shareholders Action Guide: Unleash Your Hidden Powers to Hold Corporations Accountable*.



Bill Brandt is Director of Strategic Integration for Arizona State University (ASU) LightWorks® and is an experienced energy executive. After a 30-year career at SOHIO/BP he retired as Director of Mergers and Acquisitions joining ASU to work on

renewable energy challenges. As Director of Strategic Integration of ASU LightWorks®, Arizona State University's incubator and accelerator for renewable energy technologies, he works across interdisciplinary research programs with national laboratories and major corporations to deliver renewable energy products. Brandt holds a B.S. in Chemistry and Environmental Sciences from Principia College and an M.B.A. from Wharton. Brandt has served on various advisory boards and is a strong promoter of technology-to-market collaborations in pursuit of accelerating the transition to cost-effective renewable energy and water.



Douglas Brinkley is the Katherine Tsanoff Brown Chair in Humanities and Professor of History at Rice University, a CNN Presidential Historian and a contributing editor at *Vanity Fair*. Six of the books he authored were named New York

Times "Notable Books of the Year and seven have been New York Times bestsellers. His book *Cronkite* won the Ann M. Sperber Prize for outstanding biographies. His two-volume annotated *The Nixon Tapes* won the Arthur S. Link – Warren F. Kuehl Prize. The New York Historical Society selected Brinkley as their official U.S. Presidential Historian. Brinkley has received seven honorary doctorates in American Studies. He sits on the Board of Trustees at Brevard College and the Franklin D. Roosevelt Presidential Library. He is a member of the Century Association, Council of Foreign Relations and James Madison Council of the Library of Congress.



John "Spike" Buckley serves as Principal of Grimley Capital. He has four decades of experience as a commercial real estate owner and developer of multifamily, retail and office properties and also is committed to mobilizing support and

activating investors to tackle the climate crisis. He is a Co-Founder of One Earth, a non-profit initiative working to galvanize science, advocacy and philanthropy to drive collective action on climate change. Prior to One Earth, Spike founded Earth's Call Fund, with a mission to deploy capital to innovators targeting climate change. He is an avid supporter of the Sierra Club, Greenpeace, Conservation Colorado, the League of Conservation Voters and NextGen America. Spike serves on the boards of Pharmajet, Inc., One Earth and Cryptomill Technologies. Spike holds a B.A. in Economics from the University of Colorado.



Peter Byck is a professor of practice at Arizona State University (ASU), in both the School of Sustainability and the Cronkite School of Journalism. He directed and produced the films *Carbon Nation* and *Carbon Cowboys* and is leading a \$10 million

research project comparing Adaptive Multi-Paddock (AMP) grazing with conventional grazing, focused on soil health and soil carbon storage; GHG cycling; biodiversity; and water cycling; The research includes a 4-part docuseries, *Roots So Deep (you can see the devil down there)*, looking at building a regenerative path to solving climate. Byck's public speaking engagements highlight his most unique discovery since starting *Carbon Nation*; liberals and conservatives in the U.S. are not nearly as polarized as the popular press presents. If the subject of climate change is tabled, people in general are eager for clean energy, energy efficiency, smart land use and healthy food.



Graciela Chichilnisky is a Professor of Economics and Mathematical Statistics at Columbia University; Visiting Professor at Stanford University; and the CEO and Co-Founder of Global Thermostat. She was the author of the carbon market of the Kyoto

Protocol, lead U.S. author of the IPCC and her proposal led to the 45Q law providing tax credits for carbon removal which in 2022 became the IRA providing cash incentives for carbon removal - in 2023 she created and patented asset backed ESG securities. *The Washington Post* calls her an "A-List Star" and *Time Magazine* calls her a "Hero of the Environment". She is a frequent political and economic speaker on CNN, ABC, BBC TV News and Bloomberg News and a frequent keynote speaker at leading international conferences and universities. She is the author of fifteen books and some 320 scientific articles in preeminent academic journals. Her latest book is *Reversing Climate Change*.



Rick Clark is the owner of Clark Land & Cattle and Farm Green Consulting and a fifth-generation farmer, who works to build soil health and achieve balance with the natural world. Rick has developed and is constantly improving a

systematic approach to regenerative farming that includes incorporating regenerative farming practices with organic certification: 'regenerative organic stewardship with no tillage,' as he coins it. Cover crops are used to suppress weeds and build soil health without requiring tillage. The development of this style of farming is rooted in a deep concern for human health and interest in building a system that will be viable and profitable for generations to come. Rick has received numerous awards for his work, including: 2022 National No-Till Innovator of the Year; 2017 Danone Sustainable Farmer of the Year.

General Wesley K. Clark, Chairman and CEO of Wesley K. Clark & Associates, a strategic consulting firm; Chairman and Founder of Enverra, Inc. a licensed investment bank; Chairman of Energy Security Partners, LLC; as well as numerous

corporate boards including BNK Petroleum and Leagold Mining. Active in energy, including oil and gas, biofuels, electric power and batteries, finance, and security, he has served as an advisor, consultant or board member of over ninety private and publicly traded companies. In the notfor-profit space, he is a Senior Fellow at UCLA's Burkle Center for International Relations, Centennial Fellow at Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service, Director of the Atlantic Council; and Founding Chair of City Year Little Rock/North Little Rock. A best-selling author, Clark is a frequent contributor for TV and newspapers. Clark retired as a four star general after 38 years in the United States Army, having served in his last assignments as Commander of US Southern Command and then as Commander of US European Command/Supreme Allied Commander, Europe.



Alex Corren is Executive Director and Co-Founder of ReCommon and at the forefront of innovative solutions in land tenure, ecological design and community development. He is dedicated to building systems and offering guidance for

regenerative community land tenure and acquisition and bridging the gap between high-level conceptual thinking and practical implementation. His expertise spans multiple domains, including natural building, ecovillage design, regenerative crypto economics and food production. He has co-developed a bioregionally-distributed, multistakeholder governance system for common land held in trust, as well as a non-extractive land acquisition vehicle that removes land from the speculative market, protecting it for regenerative community development and landscape restoration. Alex holds a Bachelor of Science in Environmental Science from the University of Vermont, concentrating in ecological design and water resources, and a Permaculture Design Certificate from the Central Rocky Mountain Permaculture Institute.



Chip Comins serves as Chairman and CEO of the American Renewable Energy Institute (AREI) and Founder of the AREDAY Summit, Expo and Film Festival. He is President and CEO of American Spirit Productions and Managing Director of

WEnergy. Comins connects climate solutions in a Climate Constellation of Implementation, for global scale. In 2009 he produced 13 official events at the UNFCCC COP 15 in Copenhagen, Denmark; presented at the UNFCCC COP 16 in Cancun, Mexico; COP21 in Paris, France 2015 & COP22 in Marrakech, Morocco in 2016. Comins has produced and directed long and short form documentary films for educational and broadcast television markets, including The National Renewable Energy Laboratory, DOE Wind Powering America, PBS, Link TV, BET and Discovery Networks. A longtime advocate of developing and implementing renewable energy resources to abate greenhouse gases and climate change, Comins encourages a business approach to solving both the economic and environmental crisis.



James Cromwell is a highly regarded and beloved Oscar-nominated and Primetime Emmy-winning actor in such films and TV series as *Babe, LA Confidential, Succession, Star Trek- First Contact, The Queen,* and *The Green Mile,* among others. Cromwell is also

a longtime advocate and activist in support of progressive causes. He frequently speaks on issues regarding animal cruelty for People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) and has also taken a stand against extractive practices including fracking, which resulted in his removal from an event in New York City for heckling an energy company receiving an award. Cromwell has been arrested numerous times during protests, including once during a PETA protest of SeaWorld's treatment of orca whales and once in protest against the construction of a natural gas power station. In 2022, PETA named Cromwell their '2022 Person of the Year.'



Jason Crow represents Colorado's 6th Congressional District in the U.S. House of Representatives, where he serves on the House Small Business and Armed Services Committees and the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence. A former

This includes increasing forest fires, desertification, the quicker melting of snow on the higher mountain peaks and flooding. Gualinga also spoke at COP 25 about her concerns regarding the Ecuadorian government's authorization for oil extraction in indigenous areas and her disappointment regarding world leaders who had no interest in discussing the topics brought to the conference by Indigenous people. The plight of Gualinga and her people is shared in the documentary *Helena Sarayaku Manta*, which highlights her life relating to the teaching of the Sarayaku way of living.



J. Dallas Gudgell is the Wildlife and Tribal Outreach Director for the International Wildlife Coexistence Network and a board member of the Buffalo Field Campaign focusing on coexistence, rewilding, tribal costewardship and tribal relationships. He has

nearly four decades of experience in environmental science, lobbying, human rights advocacy, social and environmental justice, individual and organization consulting, professional development consulting, diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) training and public relations. Dallas worked for his tribe as an environmental scientist on the Fort Peck Reservation in Poplar, Montana. custodianship of the natural world. Zagas are the female equivalents of Mamos. They hold the Ancestral Wisdom for future generations. They are the healers and hold the keys for the water, the earth and the air elements. Because of this, Zagas bear the responsibility of sustaining the planet. As is the case for most Zagas, Zaga Josefina was chosen and began her training from birth. Zaga Josefina is responsible to guide and educate girls during their various rites of passage. She is a teacher and counselor for her community.



Mamo Sewigu Kakamukwa (Mamo Rodrigo) comes from a lineage of Mamos that stretches through every generation of hisfamily. Mamo Rodrigo is part of the Wiwa who, along with the Kogi and Arhuaco, are an ancient people of around 90,000

who live in the Sierra Nevada in Colombia. They are led by Mamos, spiritual leaders who guide with the wisdom that comes through knowledge, appreciation and custodianship of the natural world. Mamo Sewigu (Mamo Rodrigo) was an educator and leader of his community before receiving his Segwa when ordained as a Mamo. He was a Maestro first; a weaver, storyteller, musician, teacher and person in charge of making sacred objects. Mamo Sewigu/Rodrigo was the teacher who opened the first bilingual School in 2007 inside the Reservation to teach basic Spanish and Math, as well as their Traditional Knowledge.



Virginia Kelly is Founder of Climb for Conservation, which works to educate hikers and climbers on important conservation issues and inspire them to engage with conservation causes and help fundraise for conservation and wildlife

protections efforts, with a particular focus on efforts to protect endangered species. Virginia is a former Vice President and attorney for AREI, Inc and was profiled as an "Eco Rock Star" in *Origin Magazine*. Kelly holds a bachelor of arts and bachelor of science from Georgia Tech, a master's degree from Yale University and a law degree from William and Mary Law School.

and how these two topics are interconnected. Powers is Co-Founder of the Alliance for Sustainable Colorado, which licenses office and meeting space to over 50 sustainability organizations. Powers is a board member of Conservation Colorado and the Educational Foundation of America, a past management committee member of the Environmental Grantmakers Association and the instigator of the Colorado funders' Environmental Affinity Group. His work has aired on the Discovery Channel, National Geographic Television and the History Channel. His first film, *The Cove*, won an Academy Award for Best Documentary in 2010 and the Audience Award at Sundance.



Andrew Quiat is an attorney and Co-Founder of ProvidIce, LLC, an R&D stage venture dedicated to the commercialization of free-floating Antarctic Icebergs for their potable water and thermal content for the production of water, energy and carbon

offsets. He serves as a Trustee of the 100+-year-old Iliff School of Theology and runs his own law office, in which he pursues people who send spam, among other legal efforts. She is CEO of Stillwater Preservation LLC, a wetlands mitigation banking company and Senior Advisor to the One Humanity Institute and the Women's Earth and Climate Action Network (WECAN). With forty years of experience in land, water, energy, biodiversity, and climate change, Ranney has worked with three U.S. Presidents, including an appointment by President Reagan to his Commission on American Outdoors. She is the recipient of numerous awards, including the Horace Albright Award, the International Conservation Award, Earth Guardians' Earth Stewardship Award, and the Children's Environmental Literacy Foundation (CELF) Lifetime Achievement Award.



Wiley Rhodes is Founder and CEO of the Newpoint Companies. Rhodes has four decades of experience in natural gas and hydrocarbon development. Founded in 1999, Newpoint was established as a natural gas processing and treating

company supporting the oil and gas mid-stream industry. Since 2015, the focus of the organization has grown to

include methane and hydrocarbon emissions. These efforts include starting the One Step In Foundation (ISi), to advance communications between environmental organizations and oil and gas industry innovators with the aim to reduce and eliminate the ecological impact of producing, transporting and utilizing oil and gas. Rhodes has also advanced blue hydrogen power generation and the elimination of all process emissions from oil and gas production and transportation. Rhodes currently sits on the board of the American Sustainable Business Council (ASBC) and American Renewable Energy Institute (AREI).



Bill Ritter was elected Colorado's 41st Governor in 2006, after serving as the District Attorney of Denver from 1993-2005. During his four-year term, Ritter established Colorado as a national and international leader in clean energy. Upon leaving the

Governor's Office, Ritter founded the Center for the New Energy Economy (CNEE) at Colorado State University, which works with state and federal policymakers to create clean energy policy throughout the country. Governor Ritter was formerly chair of the Board of Directors of the Energy Foundation and currently serves on the board of The Climate Group American and the Board of Trustees of The Nature Conservancy. Rogers is also the founder of Blue Planet Energy, a global leader in renewable energy storage systems.

Williams pioneered many of the early regenerative grazing protocols and forage finishing techniques and now teaches those practices and principles to farmers globally, specializing in whole farm and ranch planning based on the concept of regenerative agriculture.
